Man faces assault charge

Ho was released on \$1,000 personal bond and the stipulation he have no contact with the victims pending the trial. A pre-trial date has yet to be set.

Police responded to an emergency 911 call made by the 12year-old at 8:29 pm. and arrived
to find a 34-year-old woman and
her daughter with cuts and blood
showing on their faces.

The mother told the officers her
assailant had been drinking when
an argument started. She said she
went into the bedroom when the
man threw glasses of beer and a
vacuum cleaner at her.

The man then hit and
scratched the mother on the face,
according to police reports.

When the 12-year-old entered
the bedroom, the man reportedly
threw her to the floor and grabbed
her face. The man then clawed

tore throwing her.

Later, the man grabbed the girl's forehead and forced her head backwards into the door, the police report said. She ran to a next door neighbor and called police.

The woman's other daughter, 10, fled the apartment immediately after the dispute started and was not injured. The mother said there have been other assaults by the man, but she never recorded.



The victim told public safety officers she's dated the suspect for three years and they have lived together for the past six months.


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Water, water everywhere . . .
