"There are 30 different cases with multiple defendants," Cranmer said.

Friday's proceedings focused on the cross examination by Cranmer of Monica Zamler, who had served as general manager of The Boulevard Group. A witness for the prosecution, Zamler last month documented that the 15 bridal gowns in evidence were floor eamples sold as new.

She also provided the prosecutor's office with records from The Boulevard Group outlining the "stock substitutions," the process of renumbering orders for new gowns that were never sent to the manufacturer but instead filled by a gown already at one of the salons.

Stock substitutions is at the heart of the case and Cranmer

pointed out that it was Zamler, not the Gottschlings, who handled the day-to-day operations concerning the switches, plus noted that her employment contract called for bonuses based on how many stock substitutions were made.

"Isn't this something you negotiated? That provided you with a way to make more money. The more you stock substituted, the more you suck substituted, the former manager said that there was an implied quota for stock substitutions and that if she didn't make substitutions "I'm sure I wouldn't be employed," Zamler testified.

The corporation, as well as owners Gary and Donna Gottschling, are charged with multiple counts of

Suzie Loiselle. Both are no longer employed by the Gottschlings.
Hall told the court that she was in charge of mailing orders to menufacturers and noticed that Gary Gottschling had told her to hold all orders placed in August, and most ordered in May and July. She said that since 1986 holding orders had not been an uncommon practice, waiting until the salons' account had sufficient money to process the orders.
"I never believed the orders wouldn't be mailed." Hall said.
Loiselle told the court that she stopped accepting deposits for




