

There's no denying Bogataj has had trouble luring players with talent to SC. He's had even more trouble keeping them in school. Academics have waylaid more than one of his recruits.

Still, when Whitlow showed up at informal team workouts last summer, Bogataj had to be wary. He knew Whitlow had talent. But he also heard of the problems that had engulfed him. "I asked him one thing," Bogataj said. "I asked, Steve, do you want to play baskethal!" He said yes. So I told him that, as far as I'm concerned, this is day one. We go from here."

For the past few months. that

For the past few months, that has been Whitlow's approach to life.

His problems date back further than his senior year at CC, but it was then that they first surfaced. Whitlow was kicked off CC's baskethall cam just prior to the Catholic League playoffs after skipping practice.

He was drinking. Heavily. And it was taking its toil.

"It really started during my junior year (at CC)," Whitlow said. "For a year there, I was playing but not making any progress. (Coach Bernie Holowick!) gave me a lot of chances.

"It was my own fault. I've never said anything bad about coach Holowick!"
Whitlow enrolled at Michigan State, giving some thought to walking on. But after one term, he dropped out of school. His problem was excalating, More trouble was lurking, dead ahead.
Whitlow was arrested for stealing a car. He was drunk at the Dickerson Cerrectional Facility in Wayne County.
