# 2 teenage girls charged in beating, robbery

Two Farmington Hills 16-year-old girls could face prison sentences if a prosecutor decides to charge them as adults in the beating and robbery of a fellow Farmington High School student. The two 15-year-olds have been charged with attempting to do great bodily harm leas than murder in the beating of a 16-year-old. One has also been charged with their of jewelry worth \$500 in the March & incident, which stemmed from an argument over an ex-boy-friend.

The 16-year-old teen was besten and kicked, suffering injuries to her face and neck, and bruised ribs, police said. She lost con-

sciousness and was taken to Botsford Hospital for treatment. She returned to school Monday.

One of the sileged easailants was arrested on March 6 and charged as a juvenile with attempting to do great bodily harm less than murder and unarmed robbery. If she were to be charged as an adult, she could face up to 10 years in prison for the beating and 15 years for the robbery. Referee Martin Alvin allowed her to be released to her parents for home detention.

The other alleged assailant was charged with attempting to do great bodily harm less than murder and was sent to Children's Village in Pontiac, where she remained as of Tuesday. Referee

Charles Ludwig set bond \$50,000.

Associated beam is set for April 1 in Pontiac to determine if the two teens will be charged as adults, said Farmington Hills Police detective Bert Cook If so, they would be arraigned in 47th District Court.

Cook could not explain why one girl is at home and one is in custody.


