

Architects earn masonry award for St. Hugo Church

The award goes to architect/engineer Harley Ellington Pierce Yee Associates, Southfield, for the site and to humanize through texture, color and warmth, the interior of the vast new St. Hugo of the Hills Church, Bloomfield Hills. Mason contractor was O'Neill General of Southfield.

The charge was to create a new sanctuary to seat 1,200 on the same site as the 60-year-old Norman style chapel.

The sanctuary's shallow sloping roof structure inside and separated from the stone enclosing wall. The exterior is of random ashlar limestone walls. The interior of the sanctuary features random ashlar limestone walls, honed stone walls, white marble tile floors, honed limestone support columns and chancel wall, marble chancel floor, granite altar, chair and baptismal font.

Masonry was selected to match as closely as possible the material of the older chapel. Spec-
