The service alone, without a The service alone, without a collular telephone, costs from \$500 to \$700 with a monthly monitoring fee of \$15. The system can be moved from car to car, and Teletrac will pay the deductible for damage from the theft, such as the latest tensive column form. a broken steering column, igni-tion or door lock.

Farmington Hills Police Chief Bill Dwyer was impressed enough with the system to have it installed in his police cars. But budget constraints forced his department to stop using Teletrae.

"We used this system so that our dispatchers could know exactly where our units were at any time," Dwyer said. "It's the best system out there."

Dwyer said an advantage of Teletrae over other systems is that police know when a car is stolen within minutes and are given the exact location. Otherwise, by the time it's found, a tolen car could have been stripped for parts, he said.
