It was a good year for area swimmers competing at the state level. Two Observerland boys —
Matt Martin of Westland John Glenn and Alex Goecke of Livonia Stevenson — won individual Cleas A championahips Saturday at Eastern Michigan University.
Seven Observerland teams finished among the state's top 15, six from the Western Lakes — Stevenson, sixth, North Farmington, eighth, Northville, 11th; Redford Catholic Central and Plymouth Canton, 15th; Glenn and Plymouth Salem, 16th.
"I was just amazed at our league and how well we did," said Stevenson cosch Doug Buckler. "We showed that we are the best league in the state, by far. It was a proud day for the Western Lakes and for Observerland."
