Chamberworks concert, Thomas Kuras presented a forteplano recital at the Bellan Art Center in Troy. The American Artista series concert at Kingswood Auditorium in Bloomfield Hillis featured the American Artist Series Chamber Players and Donald Baker, oboe in a program of rare, but entitled chamber selections.

The forteplano, forerunner of the modern plano, was developed

the modern piano, was developed in the middle of the 18th century. Its hammer action, in contrast to the plucking mechanism on the harpsichord, provides for a degree

of dynamic control that was impossible to attain on earlier keyboards.

The instrument Kuras used was built especially for him by a clocal builder, and patterned after instruments from the Classical Period. Its resemblance to the harpschord caused several in the audience to marvel, before the performance began, where the fortepiano was hidden, Kuras' introductory lecture, and subsequent performance, not only settled the issue, but provided the audience with a raw gilmpse of this historic instrument.

The first half of the program featured works by members of the Bach family — Johann Craitian, Wilhelm Friedemann and Carl Philip Emanuel. Of these, I found the Fantasia in C minor by W.F. Bach to be the most imaginative and inspired.

The second half featured better known works by Mozart, Beethoven and Haydn. Mozart's variations "Ah, yous diral je Mamen',"

hased on the theme better known as "Twinkle, Twinkle Little Star," evoked a sense of deja vous among the listeners. Kuras, who is the artistle director of the Chamberrowks Series he audience with his incredible music logical knowledge. This made the program a stimulating, thought-provoking event in spite of some technical flaws and sloppy execution of the many trills and ombellishments.

J.C. Bach, the "English" Bach, admired by Mozart who incorporated some of his themes into his music, was also featured on the American Artists Series program with a Quartet for Oboe, Violin, Viola and Cello. Other works on the program included works by Eduard Tubin Jean Francaix and Schumann. All of these works are custaled the standard reprotise. Being a Bach worshipper, I never feel truly moved and inspired by most music of his lesser offsprings. The saving grace in the

quartet by J.C. Bach on that program was the fine performance by Detroit Symphony Orchestra principal obose player Donald Baker who with his capable string colleagues, lent this piece one of the best professional exposures it is likely tog lent the piece one of the best professional exposures it is likely tog Quartet by the Estonian composer Eduard Tubin. This composer, who is virtually unknown in this country, is gradually galining more acceptance and

known in this country, is gradually gaining more acceptance and recognition due to efforts by DSO music director Neems Jarvi. Contemporary Swiss composer Jean Francaix is another whose exposure fortunes have been rising in recent years. The intricate, multiple syncopated rhythmic patters in the fast movements of this Quartet for English Hom, Violin, Viole and Cello would challenge even those intimetely familiar with this work. This ensemble — consisting of Baker, Linda Snedden-Smith (violin), Hart Hollman (viola), and John Thur-

man (cello) coped with this work with undaunted authority.
