an exchange teacher for an entire school year, referring to Wayne Edwards of New Zealand who taught at Gill Elementary.
The district also has a program using student teachers who, at times, assume responsibilities over students disabled to the

regular classroom teacher, Vagozzi added.
The program will be so cautiously approached and structured that, if we have a teacher exchange, benefit should result," commented trustee Richard Peters who described the overall program as "a very conservative approach."

the elementary social study books used this year were published in 1959 and revised were published in 1970. "The new texts incorporate the changes which have occurred in this world and changes in geography."
Board approval of the new texts was unanimous.

THE BOARD also approved recommendations for the coming school year, including replacement of elementary social studies texts.
Peters explained the text additions represent a financial obligation of about \$30,000, depending on the district's expenses in replacing worn books. The budget provides for \$30,000 to purchase elementary and secondary texts.
