

Hawks win boys relays

Farmington Hills Harrison won six of 13 events Saturday and repeated as boys champion at the Milan Relays.

The Hawks scored 96 points and the host Big Reds 47. Blackney, Novi and South Lyon also participated.

Justin Dreyer, Scott Turner and Matt Zimmerer combined with Todd Haney to win the distance medley relay (10:40) and Steve Quarterman the 3,200-meter relay (8:41).

Jason Granger, Marc Ferguson, Gil Chavez and Ashan Allos won the 400 and 800 relays in 46.8 and 1:35.9.

Brook Grove, Steve Shaleb and Andy Rudick were first in the discus relay and second in the

shot put.

Harrison took its remaining first place in the high jump. Ferguson, Jason Ryman and Don Bryant all jumped 6-8.

Bryant and Dave Bjorklund also helped the Hawks capture second in the puddle jumper and shuttle hurdle relays. They teamed with Zimmerer and Haney in the former, Ryman and Steve Catherman in the latter.

"As a team, we performed better than last year," Harrison coach John Reed said. "But I don't think the competition was as good, so it was kinda hard to tell how good we are. We have Walled Lake Western on Thursday, and that will tell us right away."

CC claims Elks Relays championship

Redford Catholic Central and Westland John Glenn finished one-two in last Saturday's Dearborn Elks Relays at Dearborn High School.

CC defended its championship with four first-place finishes and a total of 87 points. Glenn finished with 32 points. Dearborn was third with 27, followed by Plymouth Salem (25) and Canton (24).

"The thing that helps us is we have good distance kids that I can move around," that Glenn coach Tony Magni said. "John Glenn is very good and Plymouth Salem and Canton are teams in Observerland that have their eyes on us. So when we get to the Observerland Relays (Saturday, May 1), they'll like to knock us off."

CC won both the shot put and discus relays. The shot put relay team of Joe Suhajda, Nick Kallas, Kevin

Jakubowski and Doug Brzezinski took first place with a combined total of 154-feet, 4-inches. Suhajda, Jakubowski and Kallas also combined to win the discus.

Suhajda recorded the best shot put throw of the day (50-1/4) and the best discus toss (144-6).

The foursome also scored in the 400-meter relay for shot putters, taking third place in 51.7 seconds.

"The shot and discus kids have come a long way," Magni said. "They've worked very hard for this."

The Shamrocks' other first place finishes came from the distance medley team of Eric McKeon, Freddie Taylor, Damon Harris and Jamie Fitzgerald that finished in 11:32 and the mile relay team of Marc Eden, Mike Mittman, Chris O'Keefe and McKeon that crossed the tape in 3:36.8.

Glenn's first place showings came in the high hurdle and in-

termediate hurdle relays. Todd Peterson, Chris Vanderburgh, Sean Brooks and Randy Ellison won the high hurdle relays (1:07.09) and the same foursome won the intermediate hurdle relays (1:25.1), which was .9 off the meet record.

Glenn took fourth place last year.

"I was real pleased to get second," Glenn coach Jess Shough said. "The meet was CC's to lose. They have depth, a good solid team."

Vanderburgh was a busy guy for Glenn as he also was on the high jump relay team that took second (11-4) and the 1,600 relay team that took third. Vanderburgh's clearance of 5-10 was the best high jump of the day and he was helped by Herb Thomas and Greg Henderson. Others on the 1,600 relay team included Ellison, Bob Lulek and Jason Crosby. Glenn took second place in the

polo vault relay as John Porter, Billy DeWulf and Scott Delane combined for 17-6.

The distance medley team of Crosby, Lulek, Jeff Tepper and Henry Honeycutt also was second (11:43.2).

CC's 400 relay team of Eden, Taylor, Brady, Pankow and McKeon was second (45.2); Brandon Dalziel, Jeff Wollschlaeger, Mark Leo and Mittman were second in the four-mile relay (19:30.2) and the two-mile relay team of O'Keefe, Wollschlaeger, Dalziel and Mittman also was second (8:43.4).

Securing third place for CC were: Intermediate hurdle relay team (1:25.6) of Jeff Betzler, Dan Smokovits, Chris Watt and Eden; 800 relay team (1:36.7) of Betzler, Taylor, Pankow and McKeon; and the high jump team of Dave Viola, Ron Blalobreski and Mike Dorrington.

Marie Tripp and Allison Noe were on two winning distance relays. They teamed with Sheri Stolsack and Jenny Hannawa to win the 6,400-meter event (25:48.6) and Melanie Renkela and Becky Sharpe to capture the 3,200 (11:15.8).

The Hawks also got second place in the distance medley relay (14:49.8) from Renkela, Angie Peans, Hannawa and Noe.

Lori Hubble, Susan Glowacki and Krista Snow were members of the winning 800 (1:45.3) and 400 (64.3) relays with Angie Peans and Jessica Johnson, respectively. Johnson, Maggie Chavez, Nichelle Howard and Snow won the shuttle hurdle relay (1:09.1).

Harrison also won the puddle

jumper relay (7:36.9) with Chavez, Amy Tolarczyk, Tripp and Peans. The lead person ran the 300 hurdles with a baton and the next three ran 750, 800 and 400 meters.

Renkela, Hubble and Stolsack gave Harrison first place in the high jump (13-6) and Snow, Chavez and Gretchen Dunham were second in the long jump (39-6).

The Hawks also got second in the coed relay (2:54.1). Chavez and Matt Zimmerer ran 400 meters each, Glowacki and Gil Chavez 200 apiece.

"A handful of girls did four events and, on any day but especially one like this with the events so close together, that's tough to do," Babcock said. "They had their work cut out for them and they did a nice job."

The Harrison girls went to South Carolina to train during

spring break as they do every year but returned two days early to attend the Milan Relays.

"It was in the back of all our minds, and I'm sure it helped to

focus them," Babcock said.

"Obviously, we hope it will be a stepping stone to some better performances in our league and further down the line."
