The project will cost about \$229,600. Residents in the special assessment district will be assessed \$257,900 and the city will chip in \$31,700 from its capital improvement fund. Community. Development Block Grant funds totaling \$104,6500 will go toward drainage improvements for the project.

City Manager Bill Costick said because the city's engineering staff is busy with other projects, he would hire a consultant to help speed the project.

"We'll farm out the engineering and see if we can't do this as soon as possible," Costick said.

The average resident in the dis-

trict will pay \$2,959.80 for the project.
