FULL MANAGEMENT was voted unanimously by the Oakland County Community Mental Health Board of Directors.

The three commission members on the Community Mental Health Board have warned that if full management is not adopted, the state and the CMH Board will drastically cut services this year. Fifty-three of the fifty-five counties in Michigan already have full management contracts
