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Jewelry store's future clouded



The jewelry cases are all but empty, and hours have been less-than-regular at a Farmington Hills jewelry store. Customers, suppliers and police wonder what's going on.

Artisan's Jewelers, whose owner and manager face criminal charges, is not exactly out of business, but hours

The business, in the Mulrwood

shopping center at Drake and Grand River, had been closed most of last week — with no explanation to cus-tomers or suppliers, said Farmington Hills detective Darnel Krause. "A woman called me and asked, 'What do I do?' " Krause said.

"She'd brought in a watch for repair and came back to find it closed. I went out there, and the place was locked and everything was gone." Although the phone had been disconnected, on Friday, a woman who said Artisan's owner Paul Ter-terian called and told her to open the store to return merchandise to cus-tomers, said the store would be open until 6 p.m.

She also said Terterian, who along with store manager Dennis Moloney, faces criminal charges of larceny over

Lisa Kreza said she had dropped off a watch for repair at the store and returned to find it closed.

"I came back and it was closed,"
Kreza said. "Someone in the store
said they'd be open in three days.
Then Thursday I came back and the
sign had been taken down. I was concerned."

2 women held in robberies

A woman told people in the two
Farmington-area tanning salons she
robbed that she needed the money to
buy food for her baby.
But she got burned.

Two Redford women have been arrested in connection with Thuraday
night's armed robbery at Sun Skin
Tanning Salon on Grand River in
Farmington.

The pair was taken into custody in
Detroit, less than an hour after a
woman in a black satin jacket revealed a gun and robbed an employee
of \$217 at Sun Skin Tanning Salon
on Grand River in Farmington.

The woman told the employee she
waan't going to hurt her. She needed
money to "leed her bables."

"She's not a pro," said Farmington
Public Safety detective Christine
Guinan.

Warrants are being sought for both women by the Farmington Public Safety Department.

A woman claiming she needed money for baby food showed a pistol and robbed the Tan Faster on Grand River in Farmington Hills on Wednesday. A sum of \$172 in cash was taken.

Livonia police are also investigating the pair, along with a male, in similar robberies.
Livonia police spotted a Mustang with two women, matching the description. The suspect was described as a white female with curly, shoulder-length hair.
Livonia police followed the vehicle, which turned onto 1-96 and headed east. The Livonia police esked for assistance from Detroit police, who arrived at Hamilton and Elmhurst to make the arrest.
The armed robbery in Farmington was the first since April 1992.
