"It was just a matter of not over-driving the car and losing that finish. It's probably the most rewarding race I've ever driven."

Stevens, who graduated from Western Michigan University this month and is racing full time for the Roush Racing Team in Livenie, will race on exint the Detroit Grand Prix Saturday, June 12.
