

Rap Line Employs Full-Time Assistant

FARMINGTON Rap Line has widened its scope of operations with the arrival in town of Jack Peuler who will assist Ralph Rideout in administering the expanding drug prevention program.

Immediate responsibility of this new leader is formation of six Rap groups in O.E. Dunckel Junior High. These

were a spontaneous request of 75 students after Rideout addressed them at a recent Student Interest Day.

ONCE ORGANIZED, these groups will be a model which, it is hoped, the other junior highs will want to emulate. Their objective is to prevent experimentation with drugs before students reach high

school with the hope that effective indoctrination will be a permanent deterrent.

Another of Peuler's assignments will be to work closely as a consultant with churches, service clubs, schools or any organization wishing to initiate an educational program.

Already he is involved with Ralph Hernandez of St. Alexander's Church in setting up some adult education classes and a prospective drop-in center for parish youth.

STATE FUNDS are also being sought for an area-wide drop-in center.

"Although I've been here for such a short time," commented Peuler, "it is evident that there just doesn't seem to be enough places where the kids can get together. I'm amazed at what Ralph

has been able to do here all by himself. In the month of March there were 700 calls monitored of which 400 were directly related to youth problems.

"I'm also pleased with the warm welcome extended to me by the board, and I consider it to be very representative of the community," Peuler remarked.

He was referring to the Farmington Area Advisory Council board of directors which includes a notable cross-section of individuals from government units, schools, service organizations and citizens.

IT WAS A desire to work with youth on a community rather than an institutional basis that brought Peuler to Farmington from the Maxey Boys' Training School at Whitmore Lake.

While there, as an assistant administrator, he counseled 50 youngsters between the ages of 14 and 19 who were confined at the school for problems ranging from truancy and drug usage to first degree murder.

Before his association with Maxey School, while working on his master's degree in social work at University of Michigan, Peuler helped organize a neighborhood club in Grosse Pointe for elementary and junior high school students with adjustment problems.

He also spent a summer in Alabama as a community organizer for the civil rights movement. His efforts were directed toward establishing self-help centers for people with low income. In this he had the assistance of students from Tuskegee Institute.

Peuler's bachelor degree with majors in sociology and psychology was earned at Calvin College in Grand Rapids. His wife, Elaine, operates a day care center in Ann Arbor where the couple live at present with their daughter of five and son age three.
