MEN'S SOFTBALL

Seaholm eliminates Mercy

Any hopes Farmington Hills Mercy had of building on its soccer success in the Catholic League were quickly dashed Monday.

The Marlins were eliminated in the first round of the district tournament by host Birmingham Seaholm, 5-3, just two days after winning their third straight league championship.

Mercy finished with a 13-5 record while the Maples advanced to the second round Wednesday with an 11-3 record.

"I think Mercy played its best game," coach Deepak Shivraman said. "We deserved to win but sometimes the numbers don't stack your way."

"Any coach would have been proud to walk out of there because the team gave 200 percent. The players realize they gave it their best shot."

Sophomore Margaret Wirth scored all three goals for the Marlins, and senior Beth Ziobro assisted on each one.

Mercy scored first in the 18th minute, but Seaholm scored the

next three. The Marlins got within one (3-2) late in the second half; however, the Maples opened another lead with the next two goals.

Shivraman claimed two Seaholm goals were scored while the Maples were offside.

"You need a linesman who is going to call those things but in this case he didn't think it was," he said.

Senior Wendy Wahl played her best game of the year, according to Shivraman, and Ziobro had "an incredible game," as evinced by her three assists. The Maples attempted 16 shots and Mercy 12.

In addition to Theresa Cisco (knee), the Marlins were minus two other starters. Sophomore forward Heather Richards was kicked in the ankle, and junior halfback Flannery Campbell was punched in the ribs, Shivraman said.

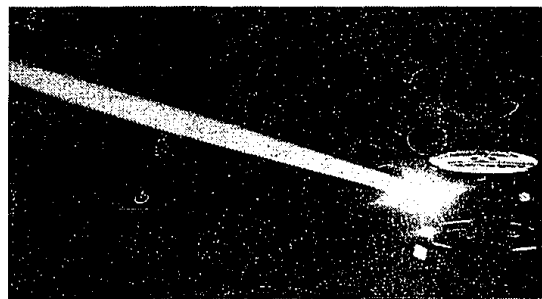
