Hills backs library bond vote

The Farmington Hills City Council voted in favor of a special election in August for a bond issue to pay for a now library.

The council voted 5-0, with council members Joanne Smith and Ben Marks absent, to ask voters in the library district for up to 1.1 mills to pay for operating a new library in a special Aug. 10 election.

The district could borrow up to The district could borrow up to \$15.5 million and issue general obligation bonds to pay for the project that would include a new library at the McMahan property south of 12 Mile on the east side of Orchard Lake across from Oakland Community College.

The McMahan property, which is owned by Parmington Hills, would be sold to the district for

\$750,000. The 1.1 mill levy would be for library operation.

Library board president Robert Flummer told the city council that the project would probably cost less than \$14 million. Although the request is for 1.1 mille, because Farmington and Farmington Hillis already contribute to the library district, the actual increase would be more like a third of a mill.

"This is a much-needed

"This is a much-needed project," said Hills Mayor Nancy Bates.

Farmington City Manager Farmington City Manager Frank Lauhoff said the Farming-ton City Council will vote on whether to have the Aug. 10 eiec-tion at the next regular meeting on June 7.

"A lot of the library budget cest is coming more and more from the local cities because the state is

decreasing its funding," Lauhoff said. "Historically, our library has high usage. Our city has been extremely supportive of the li-brary in the past."

If the tax is approved, the new library would be built, the Farm-ington branch would be renovat-ed, and the existing library on 12 Mile would be sold for \$2 million.

The cities of Farmington and Farmington Hills jointly fund the library. Officials from both cities met on May 19 in a joint budget

Another area of joint funding is the 47th District Court. That budget will increase by about 7 percent to \$1,849,969. Lauhoff said replacement of outdated computer software accounts for part of the increase.


