Industrial Park Gets New Tenant

Groundbreaking ceremonies Tuesday (Oct. 15) marked a Detroit Industrial fastener supplier's move to Farmington's Freeway Industrial Park, at I-96 and Grand River.

Bama Corp., of 8051 W. Chicago, has planned a 46,000-square-foot building to distribute screws, bolts, nuts, retaining rings, blind rivets, and elastic stop nuts as well as other metal and non-metal fasteners.

The new facility, which is scheduled for completion by spring, 1969, is 50 per cent larger than the Detroit plant and will employ 60 people.

The corporation was founded in 1953 by William Burke, Detroit's last Miller and Philip Larmon. Company officials told The Enterprise & Observer that "Bama" was derived from "B" from Burke, "M" from Miller and "A" from Larmon, with the "s" for harmonious arrangement of sounds.

Bama will have 60,000 square feet of office space at the new facility as well as electronic data processing equipment for material handling and book-keeping.

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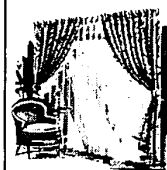
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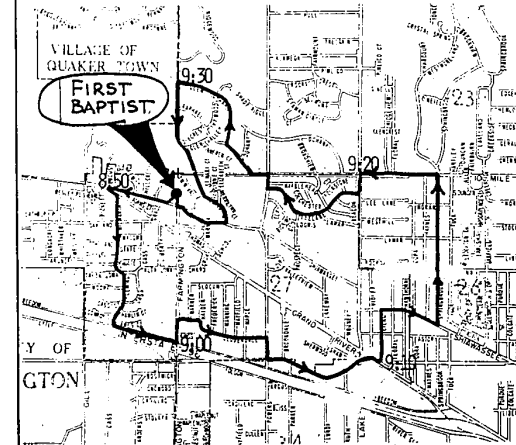
