## Livonian Killed, F'ton Man Hurt

A 19-year-old Livonia boy was killed in a head-on collision on Plymouth Road near Middle Belt in Livonia Wednesday night when his car crashed into oncoming traffic.

Dead is Daniel J. Camp of 11335 W. Clements Circle. His sedan, smashed into a station wagon driven by William J. Pearson, 33, of 23950 Brookplace Court, Farmington.

Pearson was taken by ambulance to St. Mary Hospital for treatment of injuries. The only possible explanation for the accident, police said, was that Camp fell asleep at the wheel.

The accident occurred at 11:30 p.m. in clear weather. The five-lane highway was dry, straight and level, according to the police report.

Police said Camp was driv-

ing eastbound just past Middle Belt when his car crossed the center lane into the path of Pearson. According to the police report, both cars were going about 35 m.p.h. No passengers were in the cars.

It was the ninth fatal accident and 10th traffic death in Livonia this year.

In connection with another fatal accident, Livonia police issued a charge of negligent homicide against Juan M. Camacho, 42, of 29610 Grandon, Livonia. He was arraigned before Judge James R. McCann and pleaded not guilty.

According to the police report, his car struck Mrs. Mary S. Finerman, 56, of 21613 Hamilton, Farmington; while she was standing in back of her car on a travel lane of Eight Mile in the early morning darkness of Wednesday, Oct. 9. Her car had stalled, police said.

## Central Leaflet Makes Very Good Reading

### What Are Answers?

EDITOR:  
Please permit me to make one correction to your fine front page coverage of the appearance of the candidates for township trustee at the Farmington Township Road Association, which appeared in your Oct. 13 issue. The error is most probably the result of the way I expressed myself in the discussion, and not that of your reporter.

It is true I think the two elections for incorporation were a waste of taxpayer's funds. The residents of the township were not given the necessary information for a "yes" vote that would have embodied significant consequences. Being an intelligent group, they voted "no."

The second election was, thus, a squandering of their funds. To this date the question of why township hall was near-neurotic about this matter has never been properly

answered. Since it was our money, I think we deserve that much information.

Since this need for information regarding the future growth of our area is fundamental at this time, I believe (contrary to your report) that the MSD study is an excellent undertaking. It represents not only the use of an impartial body of experts at one of America's top universities, but also a joint effort evidencing cooperation among all local units of government in the area. And it is ours at a premium price. Why the township board was so reluctant to agree to this study, and why they need a second study by Donald Oaks, a private consultant, are additional questions the taxpayers have a right to ask. We again await proper answers!

## BUSY FEET USE

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## Chocolate Sponge Cake Roll



Special occasions and dinners call for an elegant cake that tempts and pleases family and guests. Chocolate Sponge Cake is perfect for celebrating. It is glamorous, full of flavor and serves 10 to 12 easily. If the group is smaller, cut the roll in half before frosting with whipped cream. Wrap and refrigerate for family enjoyment the following day.

When the cake comes from the oven, invert onto a kitchen towel that has been dusted with confectioners sugar. Roll up with a gentle hand and cool thoroughly. Then unroll and spread with the tropical filling that combines cream cheese with mashed banana and flaked coconut. Reroll, decorate with whipped cream and chill until serving.

Velvety chocolate sponge cake, made with enriched flour, provides three vital B vitamins: thiamine, niacin and riboflavin plus the mineral, iron, to help maintain daily good health through nutrition.

### CHOCOLATE SPONGE CAKE ROLL

- 10 to 12 servings
- |                             |                                  |
|-----------------------------|----------------------------------|
| 1 cup sifted enriched flour | 1 cup sugar                      |
| 1/2 teaspoon baking powder  | 1 tablespoon confectioners sugar |
| 1/2 teaspoon salt           | Cream Cheese Filling             |
| 3/4 cup cocoa               | Whipping cream, if desired       |
| 6 eggs, separated           |                                  |

Sift together flour, baking powder, salt and cocoa. Beat egg white until foamy; gradually add 1/2 cup sugar, beating until shiny peaks form that fold over slightly when beaters are raised. Set aside. Beat egg yolks until thick and lemon colored; beat in remaining 1/2 cup sugar. Fold into egg whites. Sift flour mixture, 1/2 cup time, over egg mixture, folding in gently but thoroughly after each addition. Pour into paper-lined jelly roll pan. Bake in preheated 375° oven 15 to 18 minutes, or until cake springs back when lightly touched. Turn onto kitchen towel that has been dusted with confectioners sugar. Remove wax paper. Beginning at narrow end, roll up cake and towel, jelly roll fashion. Cool thoroughly on wire rack. Reroll cake and spread with Cream Cheese Filling. Reroll cake tightly and chill until ready to serve. Top with whipped cream.

Cream Cheese Filling:  
1 package (8 oz.) cream cheese  
3 tablespoons milk  
1 ripe banana, mashed  
1/2 cup flaked coconut

Beat cream cheese with milk until light and fluffy. Fold in banana and coconut.  
\* If you don't sift and in the absence of other directions, spoon flour directly from container into a one-cup dry measure, level off, then remove two level tablespoons per cup, according to USDA recommendations.

NOTE: If self-rising flour is used, omit baking powder and salt.
