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STRIKE MAY TIE UP RAILROADS

ENGINEERS ON 61 RAILROADS WEST OF CHICAGO THREATEN TO TIE UP THE ROADS.

DEMAND SEVEN PER CENT INCREASE WITH BETTER CONDITIONS; NEGOTIATIONS FAIL

Higher Wages Called for Would Mean Net Loss \$3,000,000 a Year to Increase in Wages.

A strike of 24,000 men, which would tie up 61 railroads west of Chicago, is threatened, following the failure of negotiations in Chicago between the American Railway Brotherhood and the Western Brotherhood of Locomotive Engineers.

Seven per cent increase in wages asked by the American Railway Brotherhood, which would mean a net loss of \$3,000,000 a year to the railroads, was refused by the Western Brotherhood of Locomotive Engineers.

The magnitude of the wage question is evidenced by a statement by the employees that the 7 per cent wage increase would mean a net loss of \$3,000,000 a year to the railroads.

Grand Chief Warren S. Stone, of the brotherhood, who has been leading the railroad men in their demands, said he believed the strike vote would be unanimously in favor of suspension of work, and that the union men would have expressed their desire by December 10.

Immediately thereafter, he said, a last opportunity would be given the railroads to meet the workers, and if they ignored that opportunity, within five hours, every engine west of Chicago on all branches of service would be stilled, the fires drawn and out of the thousands of cars would step every driver on duty.

The brotherhood contains 69,000 members in the United States, Canada and Mexico, including 34,000 on the lines in dispute.

State Militia Officers Resign. A general upheaval in Texas military circles has resulted because of the conviction of a member of the State Militia, who has been sentenced to a term of imprisonment.

To Ask Congress for Aerial Craft. Plans for an aerial military squadron will be presented to congress, the number of the air machines to be purchased has been fixed by the war department to the law makers.
