### Engler finalizes med mal reform in Oakland County

Gov. John Engler journeyed to Oakland County Thursday to sign medical malpractice legislation, plus a series of bills streamlining the licensing and disciplining of

health professionals, and one which reduces barriers for small hospitals.

The licensure bills were promulgated in the state House by Rep. John Jamian, R-Bloomfield Hills.

In a ceremony held at William Beaumont Hospital, Royal Oak, Engler signed 11 bills designed to reform Michigan's health care system. He said they would "in-crease access, reduce costs and maintain with positive." crease access, reduce maintain high quality."

"I waited 10 years for this, said Sen. Dan DeGrow, R-Port Huron, who was among the throng of lawmakers and medical enrong or lawmakers and medical professionals who attended the bill signing ceremony.
