You will hit far more putts than drives during a round, so when you think about how to improve your game, don't forget putting.

putting. There are fundamentals in put-ting just as there are in the golf swing. The putting grip is some-what different than the normal golf grip; instead of laying the club across your fingers, as you do with other clubs, you should lay the putter across the palms of your hands.

This will help stop you from breaking your wrists when you putt — a cardinal sin. I teach the reverse overlap grip, which simply means that instead of placing

your right pinky finger over your feft index finger, you do the re-verse, placing the right pinky on the club. Again, this is to avoid breaking the wrists. The best ball position for put-ting is near the left foot (in the put inside the left instep). You want the ball forward in your stance because when you hit it, you will cathen it slightly on the upswing, giving the ball torspin. If you pide the ball torspin.
