Edison tries to avoid power losses, turned-off residents

Detroit Edison is trying to build a major power link to make service more reliable, and, hopefully, to not only restore power, but restore credibility in Farmington Hills.

Representatives from the company were doing lots of explaining at an informational meeting last month. Several residents turned out at a special meeting at the Hills city hall to discuss what the company is doing to avoid future power outages.

"Why don't you proceed as if you're not a monopoly?" said Hills councilman Aldo Vagnozzi.

Mayor Nancy Bates, councilwoman Joanne Smith, city manager Bill Costello and city staffers joined a crowd of residents who came to the Aug. 17 meeting.

Lawrence Elix, director of engineering for the Oakland division, said improvements planned over the next few years in the city should help the company meet increased demand and make service more reliable.

Elix said the company has already made several improvements including:

- A new 25-million watt transformer, six additional circuits and the hook up of a 120 KV line to the Drexel substation at 12 Mile and Drake.

- Improvements to the Davis substation in West Bloomfield at 14 Mile, the Sunset substation

near the southwest corner of the city and Orchard Lake and the Hancock substation at Haggerty and 14 Mile.

But many complained that the company has had a "communication problem" as much as a reliability problem.

"People lost power without trees falling on their lines," Vagnozzi said. "We do have more people moving here, but the older areas are still a problem."

Elix said linking the 120 KV line, which should be finished by the summer of 1994, and related projects will increase the reliability, limit the number of people who will suffer an outage and cut down on the time of the outage.

"We view this (120 KV line) as a necessary improvement," Elix said. "Along with the six new circuits, this will help insure reliable service."

Elix said the line, which would connect the Drexel substation at 12 Mile and Drake with the Southfield substation at 11 Mile and Inkster, should be started

later this year.

He said new circuits will put fewer customers on a single circuit, thereby lessening the power demand on any single circuit and the number of customers who would lose power from a given circuit if a tree came down on their line.

The improvements would also mean that the affected area could be discovered at headquarters and be repaired or returned to power within a shorter time.

"Right now, we depend heavily on call from the public to know if they've lost power," he said.

Other proposed improvements for the next two years include:

- A new substation at Drake and Freedom roads planned to be on line by June of 1994.

- Three new circuits for the Southfield substation.

- Improved circuits for the Ravine substation on Orchard Lake.

- A new substation, to be called Vista, at Haggerty north of 14 Mile to accommodate the Haggerty connector or M-5 road.

- Reconfigured circuits for the Kimberly substation.

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A SPRAINED KNEE
What is a "sprained" knee?
In medical vocabulary, a "sprain" refers to a ligament that is stretched or torn. With a "sprained" knee, you develop a painful and limping gait. Usually you can relate the onset to a particular move such as a twisting action when bowling or to a fall that resulted in an awkward tumble.
The knee includes four ligaments, two menisci, the patellar tendon anteriorly, and 3 hamstring muscles posteriorly. Any of these structures alone or in combination can undergo a stretch or disruption of their fibers. The result is pain, also swelling, if irritation to the joint followed from the incident.
The features of this injury is that neither rest nor activity help relieve your discomfort, that certain positions, particularly sitting with your leg straight out, relieve but do not end the pain, and that going downstairs is more difficult than walking up.
Your worst annoyance may be at a site different from the injury. Other muscles may spasm in an effort to relieve stress, but the effect is strain on these muscles, and spread of your ache.
Never accept a physician's opinion that you have a "sprained" knee. Seek medical evaluation. The physician can separate injury from compensatory strain, pinpoint the knee structures impaired, and from this information develop a program for your recovery.

PLEASE TAKE NOTICE that the Farmington Hills Planning Commission will give formal consideration to a proposed text amendment of the Farmington Hills City Code, Chapter 34, Zoning Chapter, which amendment will amend Section 34-54(c)(3) by adding Subparagraph h, as follows:
h. The sign area shall be limited to the smallest maximum area in square feet permitted in the district in Paragraph (c) (3) above for freestanding signs except that in the R.A., R.P., R.C. and M.D. Districts, the maximum sign permitted shall be thirty-two (32) square feet. The sign area shall be determined by the entire area within a single continuous perimeter enclosing the extreme limits of writing, representation, emblem or any figure of similar character.
