## Aikman returns, but will Mr. Smith go to Washington?

Alkman has been chomping at the bit for more playing time this preseason after recovering from off-season back surgery. Ceach Jimmy Johnson has stood firm, keeping his golden boy on lee to make sure Alkman would be 100 percent ready for the Cowboys' opener against Washington. When the injury was first diagnosed, doctors and team officials predicted Alkman could miss four to six weeks Alkman could miss four to six weeks of the regular season, but Alkman's remarkable recuperative ability and his hard work during rehabilitation have expedited the

process.
"He's young, and that's the best
part about it," says "Monday Night
Football" commentator Frank
Gilford. "I had back surgery myself
a few years ago, and I wouldn't have
wanted to play right away."

The 'Boys won't be the same team without Smith, who has led the NFL without Smith, who has led the NFL in rushing yards and touchdowns over the past three seasons. Smith has been holding out for a contract similar to Thurman Thomas' \$4 million-a-year deal. Without him, the Cowboys put the running game into the inexperienced hands of rookle Derrick Lassic, a fourthround pick from Alabama, and Michael Beasley, who spent the past season on Dallas' developmental souad.

When Smith's holdout began, most When Smith's holdout began, most of Dallas was sure that owner Jerry Jones would have Smith signed before the season opener, but as the summer wore on, doubts crept in. The Redskins open the 1993
season with a new coach, Richie
Petitbon, who takes over for the
retired Joe Gibbs after a long stint as Washington's defensive coordinator. Petitbon's arrival has already been felt by Redskins followers, who have seen their team experiment with a two-back set for the first time in years. "I don't know why he hasn't been

The Redskins are trying to recover from a subpar 1992 season, despite going 9-7 and making it into the playoffs as a wild card. Last year's biggest disappointment was the performance of quarterback Mark Ryplen, who fell from the heights of Super Bowl MVP to the basement of NFC passers.

"I think Ryplen will probably be a lot different this year," Gifford predicts. "He went into a kind of a shell last year at the beginning of the season and had a couple of really bad games.

"As a team, I think they were embarrassed about what happened last season, but I would say that this year, they'll be the team right behind the Cowboys in their division."
