### Primary Money Exceeds Taxes

Sixty-three counties in this state received back more primary school money this year than they paid in taxes, while 20 counties pay more to the state, according to figures made by Auditor General Fuller.

These latter counties pay a total of \$133,566.55 into the state treasury in excess of their apportionment of their primary school funds, while the 63 receive \$1,296,019.48 more than they pay, leaving a net balance of \$862,443.93, which is sent out through the state for the schools, more than is sent for state expenses. It is noticeable that the older counties of the state are the ones which have the wrong balance. The list is as follows: Branch, Calhoun, Cass, Clinton, Eaton, Jackson, Keweenaw, Kent, Hillsdale, Houghton, Ingham, Ionia, Lenawee, Livingston, Oakland, Macomb, Wayne, Washtenaw.
