NOTICE OF ADOPTION OF ORDINANCE C-11-93, an ordinance to amend The Farmington Hills City Code by adding Chapter 35, Pesticide Control, to Regulate the Use and Application of Pesticides within the City of Farmington Hills.

THE CITY OF FARMINGTON HILLS ORDINANCES

Section 1. The Farmington Hills City Code is hereby amended by adding Chapter 35, Pesticide Control, and for said Chapter 35, Pesticide Control, the City hereby adopts and incorporates by reference the Michigan Pesticide Control Act, Act Number 171 of the Public Acts of 1974, as amended, including, but not limited to, the Amendments contained in Act Number 449 of the Public Acts of 1988 and in Act Number 131 of the Public Acts of 1993 and the City also adopts and incorporates by reference all rules promulgated pursuant to the Act.

COUNCIL:

- Received report on various cable system issues.
- Set Study Session dates to review purchase of Mercy property and final report re: ice arena.
- Authorized City to work with surrounding communities and Michigan Department of Health to develop a program on new watermain extensions.
- Authorized Detroit Edison to resolve right-of-way issues and proceed with construction of 120KV line.
- City Attorney's monthly report for September, 1993.

- Enactment of Ordinance C-11-93 amending City Code, adding Chapter 35, Pesticides Control.
- Resolution in support of changing SEMCOG voting structure.
- Appointment of Floyd Cairns to Economic Development Corporation.
- Agreement for design services for Founder's Sports Park concession/restrooms/score booth facility.
- Retaining Sigal/Tommaso Associates, Inc. for architectural design services for senior adult facility.
- Joint purchase agreement with Botaford Hospital for diffusers for Fire Department to Laerdal Corporation in the amount of \$23,500.
- Resolution supporting construction of Twelve Mile Road boulevard (Drake to Halsted Roads) and apply for Category A funding.
- Traffic control order establishing 15 MPH speed limit at all City-owned parks.

- Executive Session to discuss right-of-way acquisition and labor negotiations.

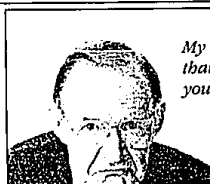

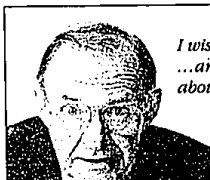

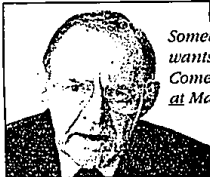
