Good Roads in Wayne County

"We have had a busy fall," says Road Commissioner, Edward N. Hines. "We have just finished the building of one half mile of concrete on Fort Road and are putting the finishing touches on a mile of gravel on the Plymouth road, making a total of 4 1/2 miles of concrete and gravel built since the 1st of October, which will be a material help to users of Wayne county's highways during the winter and spring and will lighten our work next spring when we will have our hands full in securing economical results from the large fund which will be available at that time from the sale of a part of the \$2,000,000 bonds and the \$200,000 realized from the one-half mill tax. A large amount of preliminary work has already been accomplished and we will stick to it until Jack Frost calls a halt. On Grand River road we have built a re-inforced concrete culvert, have ditched and tiled the road to Redford township line and have a large quantity of stone stored ready for an early start. Gratiot Road is also tiled and ditched to the county line and one hundred carloads of sand and stone have been stored to date."

"We are tiling Michigan avenue from Dearborn to Wayne and are unloading stone and other material at Wayne, Elyse, Inkster, Dearborn and Haggitt's siding in order to avoid delays of material and get an early start. We are also driving spiles on Michigan avenue road along the banks of the Rouge river near Dearborn, where we will widen out the road and build a retaining wall to prevent the spring freshets making further roads cut the banks. From time to time the Rouge has cut into the banks until in some places the road is little over 12 or 13 feet wide. The D. U. R. have agreed to move their track over to the south side of the road as far as possible and are engaged at the present time in making the necessary fill."

"About 75 carloads of stone have been unloaded for use at Mt. Elliott and VanDyke roads, and on Eureka road and other points where material is being shipped in as rapidly as we can secure it from firms handling such supplies. The board is looking for several gravel pits and quarries with a view to purchasing outright and thus securing a supply of stone independent of any dealers and insuring more nearly uniform shipments. Surveys are being made, our machinery is being repainted and put in condition for next year's work, and general plans are being formulated for an early start and a vigorous prosecution of road building."

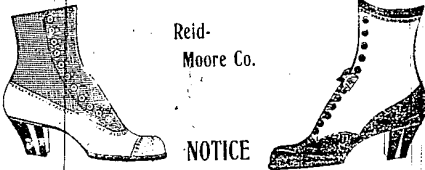
