COMMUNITY NEWSPAPERS
TO MEET AT LANSING

East Lansing, Jan. 25.—Editors and publishers of Michigan's home town or "community" newspapers will gather at the Michigan State College this week for the fifty-seventh annual meeting of the Michigan Press Association.

With delegates registered from every section of the state, the conference is expected to set a new record for attendance and interest in the long history of the weekly publishers' organization.

Prominent among the speakers will be: Gov. Fred W. Green, H. Z. Mitchell, of Bendaji, Mich., Roger M. Andrews, publisher of the Detroit Times; and leaders among the newspaper fraternity of the state.

H. T. Johnson, publisher of the Saranac Advertiser and president of the association will preside.

Prominent among the social and entertainment features plan-

ned for the meetings will be a special banquet on Friday evening, with the members of the press association and their families guests of the college at the new M. S. C. Union building.

SKATING CARNIVAL
AT WALLED LAKE
PLANNED SATURDAY

Leading Skaters Of State To Be Entered; Championship Events To Be Run

Walled Lake's postponed skating carnival will be held on Saturday, January 28. The races scheduled for earlier in the month and postponed because of soft ice were to be run on February 4, but this week the Michigan Skating Association, under whose direction the races are held, notified the Walled Lake Exchange Club that the event would be held Saturday of this week.

Nearly 150 skaters will compete in the four state championships. Skaters from all of the schools in Oakland County are invited to enter. Exchange Clubs are asked to enter two or more of their members in a race limited to Exchange Club members only.

The races for school children will be for girls under sixteen, boys under sixteen, and boys over sixteen.

The four state championship events are: Men's 1 1/4 mile Michigan State Ice Speed Skating Championship; Intermediate for boys, one-half mile Michigan Ice Speed Skating Championship; Men's one-sixth mile open event; Women's one mile Michigan State Ice Speed Skating Championship; Women's one-sixth mile open event; Junior boys, three-fourth mile Michigan State Ice Speed Skating Championship.

Lloyd Guenther, who will be one of the contestants Saturday, and who captured all honors at the Northwestern meeting at Minneapolis last Sunday, will attempt to break several records at Walled Lake. Arthur Staff, national professional champion, will give an exhibition of skating.

Miss Lovetta Neitzel will defend her title for the one-sixth mile.

On Sunday, the Twin Beach Skating Club will hold their meet at Middle Straits Lake, three miles east of Walled Lake.

At this meet, the state championship events will be: Men's senior one mile Michigan State ice speed skating championship; 200 yard dash for Men's senior Michigan State ice speed skating championships; Women's senior three-fourth mile State Championship race; Junior Boys one-half mile State Championship race; Women's senior one-fourth mile open event.

Miss Neitzel will also attempt to better the record of 12 seconds for the hundred yard dash at Walled Lake Saturday, now held by Gladys Robinson. Jean Boudot will seek to set a standard for the 75-yard dash at Twin Beach on Sunday and Eddie Glosier will attempt to shatter the record of 9 2-5 seconds for the men's 100-yard dash.

WALLED LAKE IS
EASY VICTIM OF
FARMINGTON TEAM

Absence Of Star Cripples Visiting Team At Farmington Gym; Score Is 27-12

Walled Lake fell an easy victim to Farmington High School's basketball team Saturday night in the Farmington gym. Playing without their star performer, David Long, who was declared ineligible a few days before the game, Walled Lake was unable to get started and managed to score but 12 points while Farmington was rolling up 27.

Farmington took an early lead and had the game well in hand throughout, finishing with two substitutes in the final quarter. In that period only, Walled Lake showed a flash of form, and scored six points in rapid succession. Farmington's defense, tightened, however, before the whistle blew.

As usual, Farmington found it could depend on Middletown to start its scoring, the other members of the team playing well but missing shots. After Catherman had scored two fouls, Middletown tossed three baskets in a row while Walled Lake was scoring three points, the quarter ending 8 to 3.

Middletown scored two more baskets to open the second quarter, and Otis tossed in two foul shots, making Farmington's total 14 for the half. Walled Lake tallied three points for a total of 6 in the half.

Otis began finding the basket to start the third quarter, making the period with the second shot of the game. Closely guarded by an opponent, the blonde forward stopped a pass with one hand, juggled the ball a moment, then tossed it at the basket from an angle. The ball rolled slowly around the edge of the rim three times and then dropped into the basket.

"This break" gave the Farmington team added spirit and aroused the entire Farmington squad and points by Middletown. Otis, Catherman and Rozenboom followed quickly, for a total of 13 in the quarter. Walled Lake was held scoreless.

Turner and Button were substituted for Middletown and Starkey in the final period for Farmington.

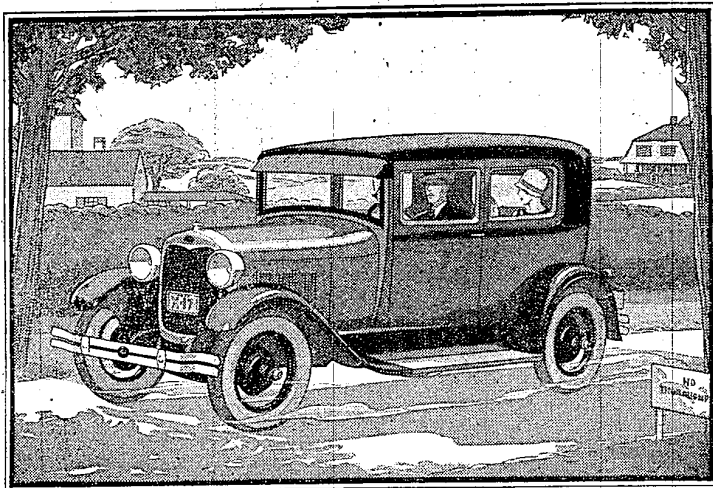

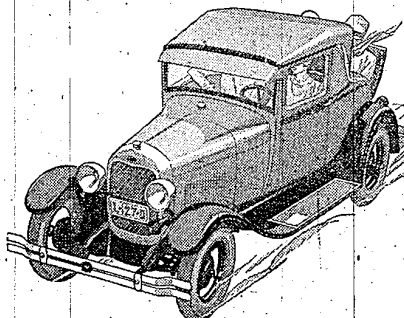
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
