**SKATING CARNIVAL  
AT WALLED LAKE  
IS BIG SUCCESS**

Two State Records Broken. One World Mark Tied; Large Crowd Sees Races

The breaking of two state skating records and the tying of a world mark, with fast time in other events, made the third annual winter sports carnival at Walled Lake last Saturday the most successful skating event ever held in this section. Practically all of the state's speediest skaters competed, before a large crowd of spectators.

Miss Loretta Neitzel, one of the country's premier women skaters, clipped nearly six seconds from her own previous state record for the one-mile race for women, and in addition, twice tied her own world's record of 32 seconds for the one-sixth mile. Lloyd Guenther set a new state mark of 26 seconds for the one-sixth mile race, in a beautiful race in which he was pressed to the end by Eddie Gloster. Guenther also held the previous record of 27 seconds, made last year.

Cold weather made the ice fast and ideal for skating, but a biting wind sent many of the crowd to shelter several times during the meet. Added interest was provided by an aviator who brought his plane to the scene and did a flourishing business taking spectators up for a view of the races from the air.

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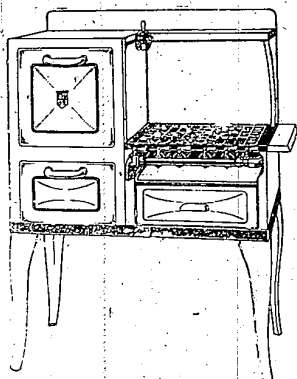

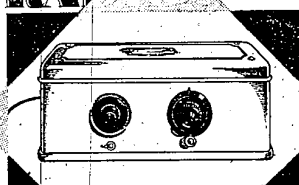
