USE A THERMOMETER FOR ROASTS OF BEEF

If the homemaker would use a
meat thermometer when roasting
beef she would get the same re-
sults each time she cooks, accord-
ing to the Bureau of Home Econ-
omies, United States Department
of Agriculture. The thermometer
is placed in the center of the
thickest part of the roast, and
when it records certain tempera-
tures, the meat has cooked to the
stage of rare, medium, or well
done. When the family prefer-
ence is for rare roast beef, the
meat should be taken out of the
oven when the thermometer reads
between 150° and 170° F., and
the meat is well done at about
180° F. The element of guess-
work is thus removed when a
thermometer is used. Meat ther-
mometers are made by several dif-
ferent manufacturers. They are
not expensive. Specialists in meat
cooking in the Bureau of Home
Economics have found that by
their use in the laboratory they
can cook hundreds of roasts and
always have the results compar-
able. They recommend, therefore,
cook by exact methods should use
that homemaker who wish to
use the meat thermometer.

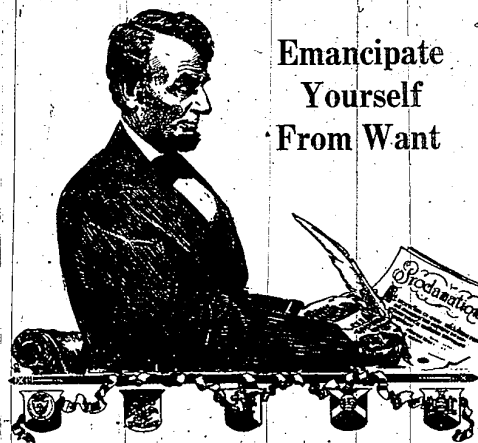
