The kitchen equipment of the new dining hall is excellent, including huge refrigerators, steam tables, and a dish washing machine. It provides for service of several hundred at any time.

Large electric signs illuminate the building on all sides. Anticipating a large business, the proprietor has installed on the street floor tobacco and candy cases, the former including a modern humidor to keep tobaccos fresh at all times. There have been located on both first and second floors convenient rest rooms for patrons.

**FARMINGTON WINS
TWO GAMES—BACK
IN LEAGUE LEAD**

Victories Over Ypsilanti And
Roosevelt Registered In
Past Week

Farmington High regained its position in the league standings last Friday night, by defeating Roosevelt, the league leaders, in a closely contested game, 23 to 21.

Farmington held the lead throughout the game, the third period ending 18 to 11. In the final few minutes Roosevelt showed a burst of speed, however, that brought them within one point of the winners, but were unable to take the lead.

Catberman was a high scorer with 8 points while Otis followed with 7, collecting 3 out of 4 chances at the free-throw line.

On Tuesday night Farmington strengthened their hold on first place by defeating Plymouth on Plymouth's floor, 26 to 12. Neither team did much scoring in the first half, the count being 8 to 9 in Plymouth's favor.

In the second half Farmington found the hoop, however, and scored 18 points to 3 for Plymouth.

Capt. Catberman again led in the scoring with 6 field goals, while Middlewood accounted for 5, with Otis and G. Rozenboom each getting one.
