EDITORIAL

LET'S BUILD—BUT NOT FENCES

During the past few days there have occurred in Farmington two of the most auspicious events in years. On Saturday evening and on Monday evening, leading citizens of the township and city of Farmington decided that it will be well worth-while to work together for the development of two important civic problems, the library and fire protection.

The joint library committee has been working on a co-operative development for some time, but the most recent meeting revealed to a greater degree than ever before the co-operative spirit that exists among many of the leading citizens of both the city and township.

In the matter of fire protection, the very necessity for co-operation, is so obvious that it is hard to see how intelligent men could decide otherwise. Together, the city and township could, without hardship, provide and maintain adequate equipment, manned by a trained personnel. If each tried to do this separately, each group could buy but one-half the equipment and maintain but one-half the force, for the same expenditure of money.

But the significance of the joint action on fire protection and the library goes even beyond this, important as the fire-department and the library are. The projects before both township and the city include many in which a real, satisfactory accomplishment can be achieved only through mutual understanding and co-operation. Every citizen who has even his own welfare at heart, entirely aside from community interest, cannot but hope that this is but the beginning of a new understanding between township and city, an era of co-operation which will make both the township and city better and safer places in which to live. There may be those who believe in a policy of isolation, but for their benefit it may be said again that "he who builds a fence around himself shuts out more than he shuts in."

THE CLERGY LOOKS BACK UPON THE WAR

The cause of world peace has gained a tremendous force in the ministers of America, if the declaration of Rev. Sidney D. Eva, Mt. Clemens, formerly of Farmington, at the Farmington Exchange Club Wednesday noon, may be taken as representative of the spirit of the clergy of the United States.

"Never again," declared Rev. Eva, "will the ministers of America allow themselves to be induced to put idealism into a war. We were asked by President Wilson to do that—we were urged to stay at home and interpret the war in terms of idealism. We did it, but we will never do it again."

This declaration by even one minister is significant. It demonstrates that another stage has come in the realization of the actual nature of the great conflict. The ministers of America, patriotic as they were, must feel that they made a mistake in permit-

ting themselves to be mobilized as a non-combatant force which nevertheless exerted a tremendous influence on the Great War. It would not be surprising to hear these sentiments expressed by a man who during the war was a pacifist, but Rev. Eva himself says that he wished to enter the service. Nor are they the expression of one who places false hopes in peace conferences, for Rev. Eva says, frankly that the armament conferences "have been fizzes."

The more intelligent ministers of this country, are demonstrating their fitness for the leadership of communities when they can look back upon the Great War, calmly review their own activities and then admit frankly that they would never allow themselves to be persuaded to do it again. And if they make their declarations firm enough, they will be performing a vast service in the cause of permanent, universal peace.
