tracks, that they indicate this to the State Highway Committee and if sufficient evidence of such desire is received, the State would consider the proposition.
The D. U. R., is understood, is willing to donate property needed for the improvement, if the tracks are moved to the center of the highway without expense to them. The company's 30-year franchise expires this month, but it holds title to a right-of-way 14 feet along Grand River.

Asked how soon he thought the widening and paving could be completed, if the movement is a success, Commissioner Rogers said it might possibly go on this year's program, but that even in such case, the bridge over the River Rouge near Lakeway Drive could not be built, on this year, because of necessity for settling of the new fill that would be required.

The rapid developments of the situation, with the bright prospects of success, if a few difficulties can be solved, have aroused Farmington business men to the keenest interest since the movement was begun.
Representing this community at the Highway Committee meeting in Lansing, Monday were: Edgar French, Supervisor; Isaac Bond, Mayor; Wells D. Butterfield, P. Devere Fleming, and the editor of the Enterprise also attended.

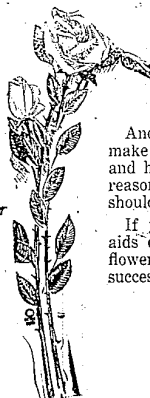
