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BUS LINE LOST TO WALLED LAKE; ANOTHER SOUGHT

Suspension Leaves Community Without Transportation At Desired Hours

Walled Lake on Sunday of last week lost its bus line, the only conveniently-scheduled means of transportation with communities nearby. Service was suspended by the Peoples Motor Coach Line, which operated the service between Pontiac and Ann Arbor through Walled Lake.

Although efforts were made to have the Public Utilities Commission require the maintenance of the line until another service could be secured, procrastination permitted suspension of the service for a few days at least, and it has been found of no avail to ask for a temporary renewal of the service. The answer of the Public Utilities Commission, it is understood, to appeals for intervention, was to the effect that it could not force the Peoples Motor Coach Line to operate through Walled Lake at a loss, as the company declared it had been doing.

Only Train Remains
The only means of public transportation now is by the Grand Trunk gasoline-electric car, and that running on a schedule which is of little value, as the west-bound train leaves at 11:12 in the morning and the east-bound at 6:46 in the evening.

The Walled Lake Exchange Club has begun correspondence with several operators to procure a bus line, and is eager to aid in obtaining renewal of transportation service.

START PETITION FOR RE-OPENING OF LAKE OUTLET

Residents On South Shore of Walled Lake Ask Drain Commission To Clear Creek-Bed

A petition to the Oakland County Drain Commission is being circulated by residents on the south side of Walled Lake to have the outlet to the lake opened and cleaned out in a manner that will give the section a good drainage.

The outlet was formerly a good strong flowing creek, but in the past few years it has become clogged with weeds and the creek bed filled in such a manner that the course has become lost, and the creek has spread out into swamps making a breeding place for mosquitoes, destroying pasture land and becoming worse each year.

The petitioners are asking that a new course be dug that would give an opportunity for drainage throughout this section. It has been suggested that when this done it would be worthwhile to have a dam built at the mouth of the outlet to keep the water in Walled Lake at a constant level. This would be of value to land owners and also would prevent fish from going up into the outlet to spawn and being killed, besides keeping the fish in Walled Lake.

It is also said that this would be of great aid to the State and a means of economy in building the new "M-56" highway. Drainage of the swamp-land would make it unnecessary to detour around it and would provide a direct right-of-way.

JAMES MONROE, fifth President, born April 28, 1758, whose administration has been called the "era of good feeling." 
