FINAL HOME GAME OF SEASON HERE FRIDAY AFTERNOON

Farmington High School Team Meets Dearborn; Hands Ypsi Defeat

Farmington High School will play its last home game of the season Friday, and it is urged that a large crowd turn out to support the team, which has won every game thus far. Prospects for a championship are bright, this year's team being the best Farmington has had in years.

Farmington high school's baseball team defeated Roosevelt high of Ypsilanti on the latter's field by a score of 2 to 0 last Friday afternoon. The game was hard-fought throughout with the victors never out of danger until the last man was put out.

In the opening inning the first home batter went out, but the next man singled and took second. On an attempt of G. Rozenboom to catch the man off base the ball went into centerfield. The Ypsi man tried to score on the throw, but perfect pegs by Cox and E. Rozenboom caught him at the plate. This was as close as Ypsi came to scoring, although one man reached third with none out in the fifth inning.

Farmington scored in their half of the second on a single, a sacrifice, a stolen base and an error by Ypsi's catcher, and again in the third on a double, a stolen base and an overthrow.

E. Rozenboom starred on the field, retiring the side in the fourth inning. The first Ypsi man walked. The second hit to short, where E. Rozenboom took the ball, touched second, and threw to first ahead of the runner for a double play. The last man hit to short again and was thrown out at first.

Facing a left-hander for the first time, Farmington made six hits.

Rozenboom again pitched well, striking out ten men and walking but two. Farmington made one error, while Ypsi made two.

Farmington is to play its last game Friday. The game will start at 4:30, seven innings being scheduled.
