WEST POINT PARK IS LOSER IN FIRST GAME OF LEAGUE ON SUNDAY

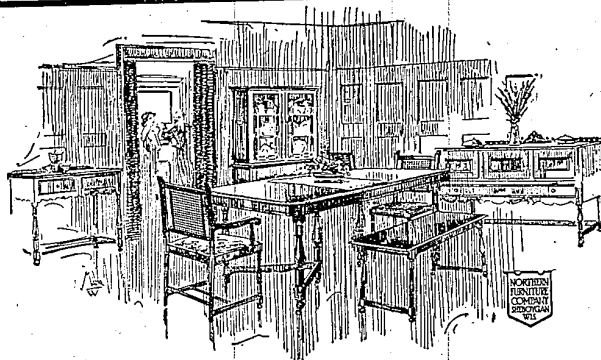
West Point Park lost its first league game as a member of the Inter-County League last Sunday, Lake Orion winning, 8 to 7. Errors by both teams were respon-

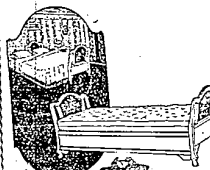

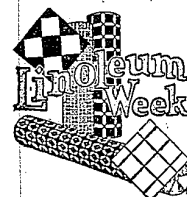
