

FIVE TEACHERS OF FARMINGTON STAFF TO BE WED SOON

'Diplomas' Presented These Soon To Be 'Graduated' From 'U Of Single-Blessedness'

Five teachers of Farmington schools will be married in the near future, three of them planning to return to teach here next year. Among those who will be married is Fernando Brethour, athletic coach, whose bride, Miss Mary Lawson, will also be a member of the teaching staff.

Those who will be married besides Mr. Brethour are Miss Evangeline Dowd and Miss Doris Ackland, both of whom will be married June 24, Miss Lulu Lockwood and Miss Genevieve Church. All except Mr. Brethour have been presented diplomas with the degree "M. R. S." by their colleagues. Mr. Brethour will be married on June 23.

Several affairs have been given in honor of the teachers to be wed, one of them a party in the form of a Commencement program. This took place Monday evening on the lawn at the home of Supt. Archie G. Leonard, and included the presentation of diplomas from the "University of Single-Blessedness." The party, which included a linen shower, was given by Miss Iva Hawkins and Miss Mary Wooditt. Twenty-four were present.

A shower was also given for Miss Lockwood Tuesday evening at the home of Mrs. Lou Thayer, by Miss Mary Moore and Miss Iretha Reed. The primary grade presented a mock wedding. Thirty were present.

For the unexpired term of Fred L. Cook, resigned, S. D. Harger nominated Dr. Elmer Switzer, Lloyd Gullens' name was placed in nomination, and Emil Roos nominated B. E. Storms. Mr. Cook supporting the nomination. Question was raised as to whether Dr. Switzer was eligible for the office, it being stated that he sends no children to school and is not on the tax roll. In the balloting, Mr. Gullens received 81 votes, Mr. Storms 63, and Dr. Switzer 13, the remainder being scattered.

No choice resulted, Mr. Gullens lacking the necessary 50 per cent. On the subsequent ballot, Mr. Gullens was given 101 votes, Mr. Storms 63, Dr. J. A. Miller 1, Amos Otis 4 and N. H. Power 3.

Following the election of Mr. Gullens, Mrs. Ben Storms offered a motion that "We retain the health service department in Farmington schools." The motion was carried unanimously.

On question of the necessary 50 per cent. Butterfield, as to the custom of reading the minutes of the previous annual meeting, President Power stated that the law has been changed in that regard. The Trustees Nichols brought up question of the athletic park lease, which he stated has been acceptable to the City Commission, but which the Board of Education has not signed. Inquiries were made as to the conditions of the lease, which is for 20 years, the rental to be one dollar a year. President Power stated that it was estimated that the proposed improvements would cost the School District \$3,000, but that "it probably couldn't be done for that." Mr. Power said that the cost would be spread over a period of years, and also that the disposition at the end of 20 years "would depend on the views of those in office at that time."

Miss E. Boynton declared that "many of us feel that our school taxes are already all we can bear." S. D. Harger moved that the Board be asked to sign the lease, and R. N. Crossman supported the motion, which was carried.

ed the motion, which was carried. Mayor Butterfield moved that "the Board of Education be instructed to have the proceedings of regular and special meetings published in the local paper, the Farmington Enterprise," the procedure to cover all meetings of the Board. The motion was carried unanimously.

A motion was then offered that the opportunity room be continued. President Power stated that, however, that "the opportunity room has been continued and the teacher engaged, so that motion is unnecessary."

HOUSEWIVES WALK TWICE ACROSS U. S. IN SERVING MEALS

Arrangement Of Households Being Studied To Eliminate Unnecessary Steps

Oakland County housewives walk a distance equal to two trips across the United States never get out of the kitchen and dining room, according to the statement of a prominent architect. This distance is traveled while getting the family meals for forty years if the range is 25 feet from the dining room table.

One New York mother wore for one month a pedometer which measured exactly the distance that she traveled while doing housework. She walked 250 miles that month, an average of over 8 miles a day.

Farmhouse kitchens are usually unnecessarily large and to make the room well furnished, the kitchen equipment is often arranged so that several steps separates the range, the sink and the cupboards. Father often has a tractor for out of door work but mother seldom is equipped with a motorcycle for her daily kitchen tour.

Michigan women who took the extension course in household management given by specialists from Michigan State College believe that they can rearrange their household equipment in such a manner that it will save them thousands of unnecessary steps each month. To assist these housewives in their plans, the agricultural engineering department and the home economics department at the State College have built a model kitchen on a truck which will visit Oakland County June 26 to 29 inclusive.

This truck will also show a lighting system and an automatic pressure tank water system. Since there has been increasing interest in septic tanks, a working model of a septic tank will be shown. A completely equipped bathroom is also a feature of the truck.

A schedule of the places where the truck will stop will be published next week.

Clarenceville Voters Reject Audit Of Books And Request A New One

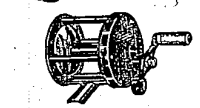
The regular meeting of School District No. 5 was held at the Central School building Monday

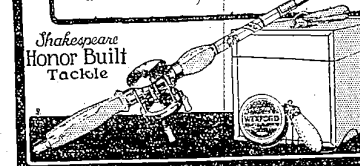
