BUSINESS SITUATION IN MICHIGAN 'QUITE GOOD', ACCORDING TO PUTNAM

"Steel and automobile" production and building continue to be the chief elements of strength in business, operations in all these industries having held up remarkably well throughout the month of May. Wayne W. Putnam, assistant vice-president of the United Trust Company of Detroit, in a study of May business conditions in Michigan which he has just issued, is expected to show a new six-month record for the first half of 1928. Car loadings of revenue freight for the week ended May 25 exceeded the million-car mark for the third consecutive week and were only 5,373 cars below the same week a year ago. Freight loadings serve as one of the most active barometers of present day business activity. Firmness prevails in commodity prices. The farm price, according to the Department of Agriculture, is the highest in almost ten years. The outlook for crops and continued farm prosperity is very good. Signs of the \$15,000,000 food deficit, immediately released \$10,000,000 for that purpose. Expenditure of money for labor and material will benefit a wide area, which has been in an unfavorable position for over a year. The business situation in Michigan is quite good. While displaying some spots, the industries of the state made a very satisfactory showing in May. There are now few instances of sub-normal production. The best reports come from the automotive industry. Cereal and farm implement manufacturers are very busy. Business continues prosperous in the iron and steel industry. Preparations are being made to doubly output and to employ 3,000 additional workmen at the Fisher Body Corporation plants at Flint. In a few weeks the summer furniture market will open at Grand Rapids, which should tend to quicken activity in that industry. Employment in Michigan scored further gains during the past month. Farm work, navigation and construction have absorbed a large number of men and have practically eliminated the labor surplus. There is a shortage of skilled labor, especially in the metal trades. Building permits issued in 16 principal cities in Michigan during May showed a total construction cost of \$17,110,748.00, a gain of \$27,526.00 compared with the preceding month and a decrease of \$1,030,122.00 under the same month in 1927. Crop conditions, in the main, are good and the general outlook is quite pleasing. Present indications are that fruit crops will be better than normal. Trade, wholesale and retail is beginning to reflect employment increases. Market betterment has taken place, especially in the larger cities. The general distribution situation is not as spot as it was early in the spring. More summerlike weather and tourists business should prove a further boon to trade.
