Will Is a Puzzle

Because they are unable to determine the construction of the last will of Nelson Coleman, whose death occurred in January of 1898, the executors of the estate—the widow, Mrs. Angelina Coleman, and a son, Elmer M. Coleman, have petitioned the circuit court to construe the will. The defendants named in the action are Myra A. Coleman, John N. Coleman, Alfred B. Coleman, Martha A. McClaren, Edna M. Erwin, Amasa S. Grace, Edwin D. Grace, James N. Erwin, Alice G. Smith, and Orla L. Pickering.

When Nelson Coleman died he left a will and two codicils. In the will he provided his widow should have the life use of the real estate. In the second codicil he provided that the real estate should be rented for as many years as he had grandchildren and that a year's rental should be paid to each grandchild beginning with the eldest. Since the death of the deceased the widow has enjoyed undisputed possession of the property and has been using the income. The grandchildren now raise the point of when the property is to be rented for their benefit. They claim it should have been rented immediately after the death of Coleman.
