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EDITORIAL

THE APPOINTMENT OF MR. BOND

The choice of Supervisor Isaac Bond of Farmington Township as County Road Commissioner to succeed the late Thomas Lytle brings considerable satisfaction to this community. Residents of Farmington, the city as well as the township, the entire section, cannot but be pleased with the prospective appointment of Mr. Bond.

In as large a measure as the selection brings satisfaction to this community, so does it bring to the County Highway work a man fully capable of the task which he is to assume. Thirteen candidates were presented for the office, and the political influence exerted was great. Yet on the basis of sheer ability there certainly could not have been much question of Mr. Bond's appointment. Mr. Bond's interests and work as a Supervisor have been many and diversified, yet roads have always been foremost among them. It is doubtful if the Board of Supervisors could have found in Oakland County a man with a greater knowledge of road work in general and the County's highways in particular. Supervisor Bond will bring to the County's road work a desirable vigor, the same that made him one of the outstanding members of the Board of Supervisors. In that respect alone he will be a valuable addition to the department. Certainly, the Board could not have chosen a more energetic man—it could hardly find a more capable one.

The County's gain, it may well be said, is Farmington Township's loss. For ten years Isaac Bond has been Farmington's leader. Within the township he has been easily the outstanding figure, a leader in practically every movement for progress. In the County he has made the name of Farmington one to reckon with. He has brought to Farmington a prestige such as few sections of the County have enjoyed.

Farmington Township will miss Supervisor Bond. In any instance, the loss of a man with ten years on the County Board carries with it loss of rank on committees and in general work of the Board. In this case, particularly, the "shoes" will be large and hard to fill.

This community extends its congratulations to Supervisor Bond. The appointment is certainly a desirable one, both for the man and his community. And yet however more important the new position may be, no greater honor can come to Mr. Bond than was accorded him a few months ago, when after ten years as Supervisor, his party caucus revealed him again the unanimous choice for re-election. A man, especially in political life, may often be judged best by what his home people think of him. The qualities that brought Mr. Bond his new and higher honor can be no greater than those that have won him the loyalty of his neighbors. They are undoubtedly the same. The people of Farmington congratulate Mr. Bond—and Oakland County.

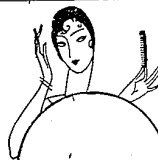
