## FARMINGTON MAYOR PROMINENT IN NEW COURT HOUSE WORK

Civic Center Plan For County Building Favored By Butterfield

A prominent place in consideration of the problem of a new Oakland County court house by the Board of Supervisors is being taken by Mayor Wells D. Butterfield of Farmington. The Board is awaiting a decision by the State Supreme Court as to whether it may sell the location of the present court house.

According to Mayor Butterfield, there are two plans suggested, if the property can be sold. One is the building of a civic and county center on a site away from the heart of the business section, and another is the sale of the present court house site only, and building on the site of the old jail. It is reported that the County could obtain \$1,000,000 for the property if it can be legally sold.

Mayor Butterfield, speaking on the matter at the Board of Supervisors' special meeting recently to discuss the subject, indicated that he favored a civic center type of development.

"It seems to me this is about the biggest question that has come before the board in a long time," he said. "We are about to provide for the welfare of three or four generations ahead. I believe we must not act hastily."

"The easiest thing to do would be to take the old jail property and build an office building of say 12 stories with foundations suitable for carrying 30 floors if necessary. There would be a lot of other things we would have to consider in connection with it such as parking space and elevators. I am not prepared to say this is the most economical or the wisest thing we could do."

"The problem of a civic center appeals to me."

"An office building of 20 stories will mean nothing in the future when it is surrounded by many other office buildings perhaps larger. It will not be a building to be pointed to with pride as our Court House. It will not exercise any influence on the young minds nor lend any dignity to the enforcement of law. If we could select a site of say five or six acres and build harmonious city and county buildings on it with proper landscaping we would then have something of which we could be proud. I believe it would be an influence for better government. Today I do not know just how I would vote on this proposition and I believe a six weeks consideration of it would be little enough."
