JOHN A. ADAMS IN RACE FOR COUNTY ROAD COMMISSION

Former Road Commissioner Candidate For Nomination At Primary

Mr. Adams' parents came to Michigan from Leveaux, Louisiana, Livingston County, New York, in 1870. They settled in the township of Armada, Macomb County, Michigan, where in a log house, on the 30th day of September, 1873, was born a son. Six months later they moved to Washington Township, Macomb County, where they lived for 14 years and this son, John Albert, attended the District School. The Adams' then moved to Romeo, Macomb County, in order that the son might have the advantage of a high school education. After finishing school he secured a situation as representative of an eastern clothing firm, where he gained a very valuable experience, made a broad acquaintance and a great many very close friends. In 1924 John Adams married the daughter of George G. Hartung, of Romeo, a prominent and active political figure of the

state at that time, but the traits of those eastern forefathers soon developed, and with the settlement of the estate, gave them an opportunity to move onto a farm in Addison Township, Oakland County, not so highly appraised at that time, was accepted, and yet today more than 25 years later they still live upon this same farm which has become known as one of the most productive in that section, and grazing in her pastures is a no less famous and favorably known herd of the Black and Whites, a herd of pure bred and registered Holstein cattle.

During this period of time Mr. Adams has answered several calls to civic and public service. He was appointed by the Board of Supervisors to the office of County Road Commissioner in 1913 to fill a vacancy. Elected to succeed himself in 1914 for the short term and again in 1918 for the 6 year term. Thus it becomes apparent to all that Mr. Adams had much to do with building and a great deal more with the perplexities of the early development of our new famous road system.

In 1924 Mr. Adams was again a candidate in the primaries for re-nomination. By this time the public of Oakland County having become so thoroughly sold to the idea, that highway transportation facilities meant more to them than any other public service development, there arose strife to name local representatives to this office, particularly from the more populous and rapidly developing districts—Bloomfield and Royal Oak Townships, also Oxford presented candidates at the primaries this year.

Mr. Adams met defeat by the Bloomfield candidate and for the past 4 years the eastern part of Oakland County, has, speaking from a geographical standpoint of residence, been without representation.

By filing his petition and making this announcement of his desire to again receive your support at the primary election, September 4, he is doing so after having been urged to do so by many of his friends. They believe in the fairness and justice of this request. They can reasonably ask your support to a man whom his demonstrated his qualifications, as a commissioner and during the past four years as a county tax payer, had the opportunity to acquire the sober and sympathetic understanding of the layman's point of view. Mr. Adams belongs to Masonic Lodge No. 41, Chapter No. 17, Past Commander, of Romeo Commandery No. 6, the Council at Mt. Clemens, Moslem Temple, at Detroit, and the Grotto, at Pontiac.

LAWSUIT STARTED OVER COMMERCE STORE TRANSFER

Former Owner Charges Buyer With Misrepresenting Farm In Trade

A lawsuit has developed from the transfer on May 21 of the general store formerly owned by Frank McCormick at Commerce to Charles Neitzel. McCormick has filed suit in Circuit Court, asking that the store be returned to him.

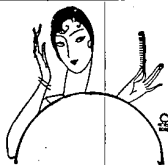
McCormick traded his store to Neitzel, he alleges, for a farm in Fremont Township, Saginaw County. McCormick charges misrepresentation and fraud, asserting that the farm is far from being as Neitzel described. He says he did not see the farm until last Friday, July 13.

The plaintiff declares that the farm, instead of being fertile soil as represented, is sandy, covered with weeds, and has not been worked for years. Buildings, he declares, are run-down, and the farm is two miles from the nearest State road.

McCormick asks are court for a chancery decree nullifying the deal and returning the store to him.

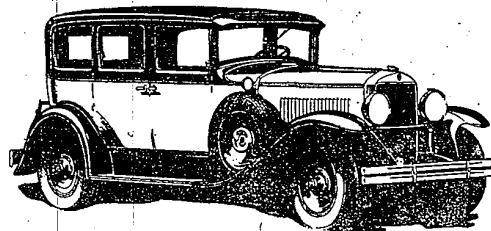

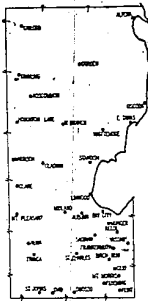
