**WALLED LAKE STREETS GRAVELLED THIS WEEK**

Walled Lake streets received a coating of gravel this week under the direction of E. F. Coe, pathmaster for this district.

Part of North, Market and East streets and all of Farr street were again given new surfacing. Some of the streets in Phillips and Welfare subdivision also were to be gravelled.

Competing for the first time since it was organized, the Walled Lake M. E. Church Choir Friday morning won second place in a State-wide competition of church choirs of towns of less than 2,000 population. The prize was \$60.

Choir leader Charles Hutton took his group to Lansing with only about three months' organization work behind it, yet missed winning the first prize only through a technicality. On the final note of one hymn, the Walled Lake soprano takes an "A" note rather than the "F" of the hymn music, achieving thereby an excellent effect. The judges ruled, however, that this was an alteration of the hymn music, and on this ground awarded first place and \$100 to the choir representing Flushing.

An indication of the Walled Lake Choir's achievement is given in the fact that all of the other six choirs competing have previously been entered in the annual competitions sponsored by R. E. Olds of Lansing, as part of the "Farmers' Week celebration."

The Walled Lake choir was the second largest in size entered. All choirs were required to sing "Christ The Lord Is Risen Today" and one other hymn. Walled Lake chose as its second hymn "I Am Alpha And Omega." The choir from Clarkston won third prize.

**CHEVROLET ANNOUNCES A NEW UTILITY TRUCK ON DISPLAY THIS WEEK**

The Chevrolet Motor Company, whose unprecedented sales and production record of placing on the road 750,000 "Bigger and Better" models since January 1, established a new mark for the sale of a new model, announcing this week the addition to its line of a new utility truck. The new truck embodies several improvements, chief of them a four speeds forward transmission, four wheel brakes and channel steel bumper. It will be on view this week in dealers' showrooms.

The extra low speed gear provides maximum pulling power on heavy roads and steep grades while normal driving requirements are met as usual with second, third and fourth speeds. A power take-off port, to which various power devices can be applied, is a further feature of the transmission.

A new low loading height, 41 inches from the ground, is made possible by a special "kick-up" feature of the long chassis. An unusually long frame support, extending behind the center of the rear axle, assures proper load distribution.

**NEW AIR MAIL POSTAGE RATES MUCH REDUCED; ARE EFFECTIVE AUG. 1**

On August 1 the new rate of postage on Air Mail becomes effective. The rate is considerably reduced, being only five cents for the first ounce or fraction thereof and ten cents for each additional ounce or fraction thereof.

The former rate was ten cents for each half ounce. The new air lines in Michigan are expected, along with the decrease in rates, to make air mail much heavier.

Special Air Mail stamps have been issued but regular postage stamps may be used and the mail plainly marked "Via Air Mail."

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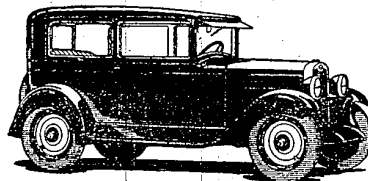
