CONTRACT TO BE LET FOR MAPLE ROAD PAVING JOB

Healy Construction Company Said To Be Low Bidder On The Project

The contract for the extension of Maple road to Walled Lake is ready to be let, according to information obtained at the County Road Commission offices Friday.

Bids were submitted and opened early this week, and it is understood that the Healy Construction Company was the low bidder among those seeking the work.

The pavement will extend for six miles and it is estimated about three miles will be completed this year.

It is to be 36 feet wide. The pavement is to be concrete and that will be 20 feet wide. The sides of the road will be of gravel.

Other bidders on the job were: the Taylor Construction Company of Birmingham; Barkley & Dull, Mark Hanna; and the Handyside Company.

The late start may prevent the completion of the paving this season unless the weather is very favorable.

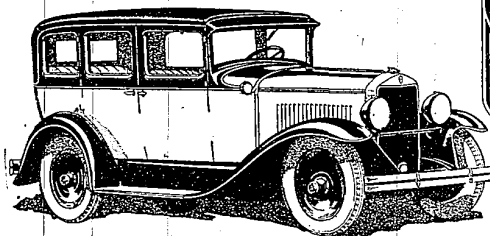
