STRICKEN ON CAR

DIES AT REDFORD

F. N. Clark, Northville Fish Hatchery Superintendent Is Claimed by Heart Disease.

Frank N. Clark, superintendent of the government fish hatchery at Northville for the last 25 years, died last Monday evening in the Hawthorn House at Redford from heart trouble.

Mr. and Mrs. Clark went to Detroit Monday morning and he was stricken on a D. U. R. car while on their way home in the afternoon. When the car arrived at Redford he was carried to the Hawthorn House and medical assistance summoned. He failed to recover from the attack, however, and death ensued a few hours later.

Mr. Clark was 62 years old and had been a resident of Northville for nearly half a century. He had a wide acquaintance throughout the state and had a legion of friends. He was prominent in Masonry, having passed the chair of past grand high priest, R. A. M. Besides his widow, one son and two daughters survive him. The body was taken to Northville Tuesday.

DIES IN MOTHER'S ARMS

Babe Was Being Taken to a Detroit Hospital

Hoping to save their baby, Mr. and Mrs. Chas. Teagan of Clarenceville, took their ten-months old infant to Detroit Wednesday morning, intending to take it to Harper hospital, but it died in the interurban waiting room.

The babe, Alger Clinton Teagan, was taken violently ill Tuesday. Dr. Tupper was called and advised taking it to Harper hospital. The Teagans had alighted from the interurban car and were proceeding toward Woodward avenue when the boy stiffened in Mrs. Teagan's arms. Patrolman Patrick, seeing they were in trouble, hurried them back to the interurban station and called the auto patrol in the hope that the child could be taken to the hospital before life was extinct. Several women in the waiting room tried to keep the boy alive by rubbing his limbs, but he died in a few minutes.
