Big Gain Made On Grand River

rontage Of All But One City Parcel Obtained, One-Half Mile More In Township

Hopes for the widening of Grand River avenue into and through the City of Farmington have been considerably increased recently by the acquisition of various parcels of frontage along the highway, both in the City and Townships,

both in the City and Township.

According to Road Commissioner Isaac Bond, who has been active on the project, every required piece of property in the City, with one exception, has been tentatively acquired. That is, agreement has been reached as to the compensation to be allowed, and the property-owners are ready to sign.

In the Township, it is reported, an additional 2,600 feet, or one-half mile of right-of-way has been obtained.

Some of this Township frontage, it is understood, is among the portions which officials have been most desirous of acquiring ever since the work begun.

Further cause for satisfaction is reported in that the total of compensation tentatively agreed upon is said to be under the limit suggested by the State Highway Department.

The one large piece of City frontage remaining, the Chamberlain property, is a long one, but officials have hopes of reaching an agreement on that within the not far-distant future.
