## PETITION AGAINST TEN-MILE PROJECT

that it would be somewhat cheaper to go straight west because of the abrupt grade of McGee Hill.

N. H. Power asked if, when the petition for the improvement was signed, it was not intended to continue the road straight west.

Mr. Belknap replied in the negative, saying that a new petition would be required for the straight route.

An estimate was then brought forth, covering the entire distance from the present termination of Ten-Mile road, to Grand River avenue, thus including the cost of paving Shiloh street.

Before this was read, on question of Mayor Butterfield, Mr. Glasgow said that estimates had been prepared on only the one route under consideration.

The estimate was read, totalling \$95,944.50, of which \$12,222.50 is for the bridge. Ten per cent added to the \$85,945.50 amount brought the figure to \$105,533.35.

Mr. McGee declared, "I know the temper of the people of this community. I was born and I live here. The only information we have obtained from our 'local paper is that the amount 'the City would have to pay is '20 to 25 per cent. I want to 'know how much the County is 'going to pay of the cost of this 'road. Will the County pay more 'than 25 per cent?'

Commissioner Thompson said that the Commission had "practically 'decided on 25 per cent," and that this would be the maximum. In response to a question, he said that the Township would pay 5 per cent, and the City would be expected to pay 20 per cent, leaving 50 per cent on the assessment district.

"Calculating five per cent for 'the Township and 25 per cent 'on the County, where does the 'other 70 per cent come in," asked Mr. McGee. "The 70 per cent 'is left on the City, partly direct 'and partly indirect."

Commissioner Thompson said that the estimate was purposely placed high, and that the cost "cannot go any higher and may go 'low," the estimate.

"Is it fair then, to say that the 'people of this community will 'have to pay \$50,000 for this 'road?" asked Mr. McGee. Commissioner Thompson and Mr. Bel-

knap said that it was a fair statement.

Cites Property Damage

Mr. McGee then declared that he has had Detroit real estate men and engineers look at the area and that they expressed the
