James E. Lawson won easily, getting 119 in the City to 43 for Jones and 38 for Gabel, and 124 in the Township to 63 for Jones and 43 for Gabel. Congressman Grant M. Hudson polled 175 in the Township to 82 for Cook and 169 in the City as against 65 for Cook.

Isaac Bond was elected delegate

to the County convention from the Township, and Bernhard Meyer and N. H. Power from the City. Twenty-five other citizens of Farmington and somewhere in Oakland County were named by City voters, who were instructed to write in the names of the choices. In addition to the Farmington citizens, Circuit Judge Frank L. Doty and Earl L. Phillips of Pontiac each received a vote for delegate, while former sheriff James Butler received two votes. Frank Lee and Spencer Heenev each received one vote for delegate to the Democratic County Convention.
