City Hindered By Lack Of Funds

Lack of funds Monday night prevented the taking of two steps favored by the Farmington City Commission, one a matter of con-

Fire Commissioner Olin Russell strongly urged Monday night the engaging of a man who would remain on duty at the fire half nights. "We never have had trouble during the day," said Commissioner Russell. "The danger is always greatest at night. Someone should be here all the time, every night, to be ready in a moment in case of fire." Commissioner Harrison Johnson supported this opinion and suggested hiring a fireman at once.

Fire Chief Harvey Blough has been working at or close to the fire hall continuously for the past two weeks. The arrangement is temporary, however.

Another matter on which the Commissioners were inclined to take action, but were balked by lack of funds, was lowering the grade of Brookdale drive, at the south end. TREASURER-SPENDS LITTLE Paving Provision Feared Illegal; Passage Delayed

Question Raised On Amendmen To Charter; Commission Postpones Action

Farmington's proposed paving program almost got on its way the voters of the City Monday evening, but was temporarily delayed again when a question iwas brought up as to the legality of the proposed amendment to the City charter.

The amendment, which would eliminate the present provision limiting special assessments for street improvement to 25 per gent of the valuation, was filed with the City Commission by Corporation Counsel John J. Schultd. Along with this amendment was another which would eliminate the present provision requiring the City Commission, when there is only one candidate for a City office, to name another. The mendment states that the City Commission may have added candidates, whereas at present the wording is "shall".

The paying amendment would empower the City Commission, when a street is paved, to designate an assessment district, and assess all property therein according to benefits derived.

Both amendment wer read and discussed, and Commissioner Leo Gildemete to the people at the election on November 6. Commissioner Clarence Bicking suggested that before passing the amendment and submitting it to the people, it would be well to obtain opinion as to whether such an amendment would be legal, in view of a 25 per cent provision in the Home Rule Act. The Act refers to fourth-class cities and prevents assessments over 25 per cent in such cities, but no mention of fifth-class cities, such as Farmington, could be found.

School District Loans City \$9000

Engine-Money Goes Back In Same Pocket

An unusual but highly com-mended "deal" between the City of Farmington and the School District was completed last Mon day evening at the meeting of the City Commission, when the City borrowed \$9,000 from the School District, for five years.

The financial arrangement had

amaziciat arrangement had been contemplated for some time, but doubt was expressed whether the School District could loan money. The District has a large sum on hand obtained from a bond issue for the purchase of property, which was never acquired.

When the City purchased its mew fire engine recently, on yearly payment plan, it was suggested that the School of its arrplus to the City and enable the municipality to obtain a discount and also save interest. As soon as the legality of the proceedings was, determined, arrangements were completed.

The School District loans the money to the City at five per cent, as compared with six per cent which the City was paying on its contract. In addition, the manufacturers offered a discount of two per cent for cash.

Under the resolution passed by the City Commission, a sinking fund is established with which to retire the loan, and it is said that four per cent can be obtained by the City on deposits made into the sinking fund.
