## UNITED STATES ARMY BAND TO PLAY, AIDING LIONS' CHARITY WORK

Residents of Oakland County will have an opportunity to hear one of the country's foremost military bands October 15, when the United States Army band appears for two concerts at Pontiac, at the Oakland Theatre, under the auspices of the Pontiac Lions club.

Proceeds of the concert will be placed in the club's defective vision fund, which is used to aid school children of the county with defective vision, whose parents are unable to pay for necessary treatment.

During the past year the Lions club has been responsible for supplying treatment and glasses for 72 school children in all parts of Oakland County. A considerable number of these cases were from rural districts of the County where such handicaps are less likely to be discovered than in the cities. As the County and townships do not provide for this type of treatment the Lions club offers practically the only recognized relief for children so afflicted.

Tickets may be purchased by mail. No seats will be reserved in the afternoon, at which children's tickets will be 50 cents and adults \$1. In the evening prices will be \$1, \$1.50, and \$2, the two higher prices including reserved seats. Checks or money orders for seats should be mailed to the Lions Club, Box 115, Pontiac.

## GRAHAM-PAIGE BREAKS THREE-MONTHS RECORD DURING THIRD QUARTER

Graham-Paige ended the third quarter of 1928 with the largest three-months' production in its history, totaling 26,742 cars, nearly more than the output for the whole of last year. The third quarter more than doubled the output of the first quarter of the current year.

For the first nine months of 1928, Graham-Paige production totaled 65,486 cars, three times the total of 21,881 for the whole of 1927.

## PETITION FOR NEW BUS LINE TO BE RUN THROUGH WALLED LAKE

A petition has been filed for a franchise to operate a bus line from Pontiac to Ann Arbor, the

route to pass through Walled Lake, Wixom, New Hudson and South Lyon.

There is reported to be opposition from the Peoples Motor Coach Company, which abandoned its line through Walled Lake last summer. It is understood that company is objecting because it runs a line from Pontiac to Ann Arbor passing through Farmington.

The hearing on the application will be held at Lansing on Saturday, October 6.

## PONTIAC REGISTRATIONS LEADS ALL OTHER SIXES

Continuing the record-shattering pace it has maintained since its introduction, the Pontiac Six for the three-month period ended July 31st, led all six cylinder cars in new car registrations in the United States, according to W. R. Tracy, vice-president in charge of sales.

This relative standing, based on the most recent compilations received by Mr. Tracy from R. L. Polk and Company, credits the Pontiac Six with a total of 61,880 registrations during the three-month period—more than 1,000 cars in excess of its closest competitor, and nearly 2,000 units ahead for the single month of July.
